



WHAT ISSUES DID WE IDENTIFY?

WHAI 1550E5 DID WE IDENIIFY:





- Discontinuous access to technical and professional assistance.
- Lack of opportunities for training or updating knowledge
- Need for technology adapted to small-scale production.
- Individualistic vision of production and marketing.
- Difficulties in Access to a sanitary calendar.
- Lack of adequate infrastructure for food storage, handling and transportation.
- ➤ Lack of working capital to generate stock
- Limited opportunities to access credit and investments.
- Lack of access to registrations, licenses, trademarks and traceability for the enterprises.

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


Performance summary up to MARCH 2023

77 projects were evaluated until March 2023 and 71 were approved







15 productive activities assisted, Mainly

in the beekeeping sector:

- infrastructure improvements (special loans)
- Supplies and beehives (microcredits).

Then:

➤ Textiles and cattle raising, Bakery, delicatessen, brewery and natural fertilizers.

- Emphasis on the detection of needs at the local roundtables, as the starting and end point for actions
- > Definition of credit lines and investments in a participatory manner.
- Integration of new actors.
- Improving communication between the internal and external stakeholders...





- Cooperation in the NETWORK has been strengthened through the collaboration of other programmes, both public and private.
- Development of different operational strategies with local participants in the context of a pandemic. E.g ensured that food supply was maintained. (markets centralized 200 km away)

QUANTITATIVE ACHIEVEMENTS

QUANTITATIVE ACRIEVENIENTS

- ➤ The territory includes more than 50 localities, only 4 have more than 10,000 inhabitants.
- ➤ The proposed target of the project implemented from November 2019 to March 2023, was 880 beneficiaries. The assistance achieved so far is 1331 participants.
- ➤ The project committed to train 380 people and so far, 662 persons have been trained and we continue to plan actions according to the demand that arises.
- ➤ Investments were planned for 380 persons and due to adequate management and interaction with other institutions, 565 persons have been assisted and we continue to work.





- ➤ Participatory evaluation of loans has been implemented, with 71 credits delivered. Several recipients have repaid their loans and accessed a second stage.
- ➤ There are 13 Local Development Committees, of which 11 have regular participation from over 100 people.
- Currently, eight institutions and enterprises have joined V.K.L and BMZ, which co-finance the project. Additionally, ten public institutions participate in the Operational Board, which is responsible for project execution.

- Our organization provided monitoring, technical assistance, and training to over 100 beekeepers in collaboration with the Coordination of Beekeeping at the Government of Entre Ríos and the Beekeeping Training School.
- Deliver safety and initiation kits to enable 6 beekeeping extraction rooms.
- Work articulated with the Cooperativa Apícola del Paraná (purchases honey at a fair price from small producers for export to Germany, Spain, Canada, and Japan)
- Relocation of the truck purchased under the previous project with funding from German cooperation.





Sectorial articulation as a work strategy to execute investments, training, credit lines and technical assistance:

- <u>Dairy Board:</u> (Dairy farms have been improved through loans, credits, training, and investments by national and provincial government institutions, universities, and productive sectors).

- Poultry and small animals roundtable: INTA, Senasa, SAFCI, Secretaria de Producción.
